

After trawling through the various PT websites I came across a woody kit for my PT, WOW that looks fantastic, I have always loved 50s American cars.

After a few months thinking about it I decided to bite the bullet and bought one through Ebay.

I know it is not to everyone's taste but that's what I like about the PT you can create your own individual style and stand out from the bland tin boxes on our roads.

My car is a 2001 PT in Aquamarine, it does not have, or ever has had, any badges on the tailgate, every car I have seen has either limited or something, Very strange.

The PT Woody kit consists of pre-formed woodgrain vinyl type material pieces, pre-cut plastic woodgrain raised edge pieces, a reel of Pinstripe tape and 2 widths of masking tape.

I must admit when I first read the assembly manual that came with the kit it seemed a little daunting.

I was waiting for a few nice warm days in the Summer to get on and fit it, (fat chance in this country). I even took a week off work to get it done and the weather was cool and overcast, still I was determined to fit it and at the end of my weeks holiday I set about preparing the car by first heating up and removing the badges on both front doors, washing the car down and drying it, and then using a tar/degreasing fluid, degreased all the areas where the vinyl would be fitted.

The next stage according to the manual was to fit the templates, these are pre-cut pieces that fit on various areas of the car where there is not a distinctive body line, this is to aid where the trim finishes.

To be honest I found them not necessary because firstly when fitted as instructed the trim would still not reach the edge of the templates, and secondly the fitting of the woodgrain pieces are determined to a great extent on cut-outs for the door handles etc.

I did start to fit the templates but after a while I found them more of a hindrance than a help.

I then lightly sprayed the car where the first piece was to be fitted with window cleaner, also spraying the back face of the woodgrain vinyl and gently slid it into the approximate place on the car, in this instance the rear of the drivers front wing where the door opens, using the window cleaner enables the vinyl to slide around on the car to find the correct place before drying out.

To enable me to ensure that the first piece was in the correct place I offered up the surround trim and lined this up using the belt-line mould on the car (1/4 inch below it) as a template. Once I was happy I then started on the drivers door woodgrain vinyl, here is where the fun starts.

The placing of the vinyl is determined by the pre cut-out for the door handle, which is fine, just apply the window cleaner as before, place the vinyl on the door fitting over the door handle and slid away to your hearts content lining it up so the top edge is level with the first piece. The problem I found was as this is an American kit this would be the passenger door and as such would not have a keyhole fitted, (UK cars have a keyhole on both sides, probably to stop having to make different doors for the foreign market.

Anyway, the only thing to do was to carefully trim round the keyhole, this was easier said than done, and did not come out as good as I would have liked. I will fit a chrome ring around the keyhole to tidy it up. (If I had noticed it earlier I would have removed the door trim and lock).

You have to ensure that the vinyl overhangs the door sides so it can be wrapped round the door edges, I found that in some cases the vinyl could have been 5mm longer as the fold-overs are not equal.

Carry on fitting the pieces around the car as explained, and keep going back over the previous fitted vinyl and squeegie out as much of the air bubbles as possible, (not easy as it will slide about a bit). I then left it overnight to dry out.

Next morning I could see that there were still air bubbles on various panels, I then used a small needle, popped them and rubbed them flat, even next day you can still lift the vinyl and re-lay it if you want.

The main problem areas with the vinyl fitting is around corners. It is impossible not to get the odd crease, even warming it up, you can if you are really careful slice the vinyl and re-lay it.

I feel sure if it had been a hot day these problems would not have been half as bad.

The next stage is to fit the raised edging trim.

Each piece is coded and referenced in the instructions, you just peel off the backing tape and press it in position, ensuring that no more than 1/4 of the edging is on the vinyl. 3/4 is stuck to the car. Trim the vinyl if necessary, this was very easy and very rewarding as you can see the woody taking shape with every piece you fit.

For the pieces of edging that form round the back wing they give you a special glue which seems to work fine.



All that was required now was to fit the pinstriping to the vinyl, this is to simulate planking on the car. Again, with patience it went on OK.

To sum up, was I glad I fitted it YES. Did I learn anything from doing it YES. Would I do it again YES.

Lessons Learnt : Pick a warm/hot day, either cut out the keyhole in the vinyl (not easy) or remove the lock from the door.

Take a look at the photos and see what you think.


If anyone fancies having one or a similar trim kit fitted and don't fancy doing it themselves I'm sure we could come to some arrangement.
